From the Sacred Fire of the National Board of Elders

Hello to all. National Longhouse has been in existence since 2002, when the very first Native Sons & Daughters Programs Longhouses were born. The program has grown considerably and now exists in multiple states and we proudly say, is coast-to-coast. A lot has been accomplished, growing a business and a program from very meager beginnings to where it is today.

All of this has been accomplished on a relatively small budget. Although the budget has grown over the years as the overall program size has grown, there has only been one increase, in 2014, in the family membership dues that NLL charges annually. These membership dues are the sole source of income that NLL uses to run the business. Examples of the major expenses are things such as insurance, background checks, program supplies (given to each family upon joining) and hosting the annual meeting where National, Regional and Longhouse representation meet to help guide the program on its future path.

A portion of the funds are also directly (re)invested into the promotion of the program, both at a Local Longhouse level as well as at a national level. As mentioned, the annual membership dues, currently \$35.00 per family, have only been raised once since 2002. As costs continue to increase for most all the major expenses, NLL must examine yearly, if the projected income will be enough to maintain a healthy bottom line for the business of National Longhouse. At the most recent annual meeting in February 2019, the National Board of Elders realized that the projected income is not keeping pace with the costs of running the business. *In just one major example, the cost of our overall insurance premium has increase* 45% since 2014.

It was after much discussion that a decision was made that beginning with 2019-2020 program year, annual dues per family will increase from \$35.00, to \$45.00 per family. NLL does not take this decision lightly and will continue to work diligently to make the best use of your membership dues, while continuing to support the program overall as it feels is necessary. We sincerely hope you understand the need for this increase in dues. Sincerely,





Native Sons and Daughters tribes from all over Florida gather each year to celebrate at the Sunshine State Pow Wow.

Tribes representing Nations from Ft. Lauderdale, Boca Raton, Hollywood, Tampa, West Palm Beach, Orlando, Winter Garden, Cape Canaveral and Jacksonville were in attendance. Held annually, each of the member groups gather to demonstrate crafts, banners, Native American regalia, coup sticks, drums, tribal shirts and a host of individual items that specific children have assisted in creating. As one father stated, "I can't believe how many different types of crafts other tribes have come up with. This gives our tribe a host of options moving forward. Thanks for sharing".

This year's event was hosted by the Canaveral Nation located in Melbourne, FL. Close to 600 members from around the state joined us for the event. This year's Pow Wow took on a very special meaning as the Chairman of the Board of Elders, Don Bittala (Brave Eagle), The National Assistant Chief, Mike Ryan (Wild Eagle) and the State Chief of Florida, Brian Quirk (Flaming Arrow) were all in attendance. The campers were granted beautiful weather by the Great Spirit and were even given an opportunity to witness a live rocket launch. Some of the entertainment at this year's Pow Wow included; Jimmy Sawgrass, Fancy Hoop dancing, joke telling, a snow cone station, bounce houses, the mounted sheriff's patrol and even a midnight rendition of dad's kickball.

State Pow Wow Chief, Brad Zeiler served as Pow Wow host and his Canaveral crew was able to create memories for a lifetime for the children in attendance.

A very special sacred fire culminated in NSD Chairman, Don Bitalla presenting the Canaveral Nation with their new NSD Charter. That was immediately followed by NSD FLRAL State Chief, Brian Quirk presenting the Space Coast Maidens were their new NSD Charter. The furthest traveled was once again won by Andrew "Eagle Feather" Stainsby (he flew in from Asheville, NC).

This organization was developed to help strengthen family relationships between fathers and children. Each Nation or Longhouse experience enables father and child to have fun while sharing new adventures.

As the parent of a young child, you have the tremendous opportunity to get to know your child. Spending quality one-on-one time with your child will help build a strong bond of trust and memories that will last a lifetime.

The Western Reserve Native Sons and Native Daughters longhouses joined together to adopt families for Christmas through the Leprechaun Foundation. The Leprechaun Foundation is a northeast Ohio organization that adopts families of children with severe illnesses who are hospitalized during the holidays at one of the many hospital systems.

The Leprechaun Foundation is an anonymous organization that works with volunteers to provide a complete Christmas for both the children as well as their entire family. The vision of a complete Christmas includes wrapped presents for the hospitalized child as well as presents for any siblings and their parents. A Christmas is not complete without a Christmas dinner; therefore, volunteers are expected to also provide gift cards for the purchase of dinner to feed the entire family.

This year the joint longhouses "adopted" 8 families in the northeast Ohio area. Individual. Tribes adopted these families with many tribes turning this activity into multiple events centered upon the lesson of giving back to those less fortunate than themselves.

Western Reserve Longhouse (Ohio) Native Sons Annual Night at the Races Fundraiser

On March 16, 2019 the Western Reserve Native Sons held their annual Night at the Races. The event, now in its third year is an adult only event that is held at Quirk Cultural Center in Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio. The event raises funds to help defray the cost of events, provide fee events, and provide assistance to members in times of need.

When running one of these fund raisers an organization sells both admission tickets and horses that will race in the 10 featured races of the evening. When a horse is bought the owner gets to name their horse and if their horse wins the race, they win double to cost of the horse and a trophy as the owner. This year the longhouse sold out all of the horses in advance and had 90 total attendees, both records for the event.

The longhouse also had several baskets as silent auction items which included scholarships to Camp



Carl, one of the camps that the longhouse has attended. The title sponsor of the event was Daniels Amish Furniture (owned by a program alum) with secondary sponsorships provided by Camp Carl and Top-Level Martial Arts. These organizations, along with all of the individual race sponsors, helped the longhouse raise nearly \$6000 at the event.

This year the longhouse used a



committee structure to organize the event, this helped to distribute the load of work and added to the success of the event. If you want to purchase a horse for next year keep an eye on this space.








Crooked River Longhouse (NE Ohio): 2019 Camp Fitch Review Continued

CIRCLEBRIDGE TRAINING!



That's right! Training for how to perform all the CircleBridge functions will be available on April 1st. You will receive information about how to sign up in an email, and we plan to have more information on the National Website.

The training is FREE!

Learn how to harness the power and functionality of this great tool to help you conduct event registration and payments, manage tribes, member profiles officer positions, produce rosters and lists, communicate with Longhouse members, and perform Longhouse accounting.

The training is online, self-paced, and there are NO tests!


Our goal is to enhance your learning and usage of the CircleBridge Registration software, so in each lesson we demonstrate how to perform each function, and then give you the opportunity to practice your new skills in a Demo CircleBridge




Longhouse setting. After you practice, you will rate the training and your own ability before you try it in your Local Longhouse.

CircleBridge Training!

ONLINE COURSE: Never taken an online course before? Perhaps now is the time to try! In addition to being free and not having any tests, the course is structured in an easy-to-follow sequence. First, you will have an orientation to CircleBridge and the online course environment (see 'Moodle' below). Each lesson presents you with the purpose of each function followed by a demonstration video (Image 1) and downloadable step-by-step instructional document (Image 2). The videos and instructions will also be available after you complete the training. You will then respond to some (not more than two) self-check questions, which will provide you with feedback on your answers, and then you will be ready to practice the function.







CIRCLEBRIDGE TRAINING!

PRACTICE in a SIMULATED CIRCLEBRIDGE LONGHOUSE: We don't want you to change any of the information in your Local Longhouse's CircleBridge, so you will practice in the "Training Wolf Longhouse" CircleBridge site. The site will be reset each night so if you don't do something right, or if you want to try a function several times, it won't hurt the software! So, don't be afraid to practice! That's what it's there for!

RATING YOUR ABILITY: At the end of each lesson, you will rate your confidence in your ability to perform the lesson function, and you will be asked to provide comments and suggestions about the lesson. Some functions are more difficult than others, so don't worry if you rate your ability low on the scale. The course designer probably feels the same way about some of them! Your rating and comments will provide the course designer will important feedback about the training, and he will use that feedback to maintain or improve the course where necessary. MOODLE: Moodle is a FREE Learning Management System which will store and present the training. However, the FREE version is limited to 25 participants at a time so if you wish to take the training, we would like you to complete it within 90 days. If it gets close to the 90-day mark, we will contact you and provide an extension if needed.

BADGES and CERTIFICATE of COMPLETION: As you proceed through the functions, you will collect 'badges' for completing a specific set of lessons related to Longhouse positions. Upon completing the course, you will receive a Certificate of Completion certifying you as a Local CircleBridge Administrator!
